GROOMING YOUR POULTRY TO SHOW

Your leader can help to show you how to handle your birds properly. The most important thing is to be kind, gentle and quiet around your birds. Handling and working with them frequently will make them become tame more easily.

You will need to feed your poultry a little extra for a few weeks before the show to give their feathers shine and their eyes a special sparkle.

You will also need to keep their housing especially clean so their feathers don't become soiled. If the feathers are dirty you can wash them gently in warm water with a little mild soap, taking care to rinse them well. Be sure the birds dry in a warm (not hot) draft free area.

HOUSING, FEEDING AND EQUIPMENT

Poultry can be easily cared for and handled by smaller boys and girls, like you. Each kind of bird has its own special needs. Your family and leader will help you to learn which works best for your type of poultry.

An important need for poultry is safety. Be sure the buildings and fencing are secure. You do not want your poultry to get out and be lost or harmed and you do not want animals that might harm them to get inside the fencing.

Dry, clean litter or bedding is needed for most poultry.


Young poultry need warmth from their mother or some other source such as a brooder or light.

As some birds grow older they may need to have a place to roost. Some poultry need special feeders and water containers.






Color this goose the same as your goose.
