PARENT & GUARDIAN ROLES

First and foremost, 4-H is a family program – a place where adults and their children can learn and grow together. In 4-H, you as the parent or guardian are very important, and you are always invited and encouraged to participate in all 4-H club activities. We recognize every family's schedule is different and you may not be able to attend every club function, but there are many different ways that you can contribute to your child's 4-H group.

Your 4-H club leader & Extension staff will work with you to help give your family an understanding of your clubs meeting times, requirements, & opportunities.

FOR PARENTS: Why 4-H?

As a parent or guardian, these are the following roles you need to fulfill:

- Provide transportation for your child to and from 4-H events.
- Attend 4-H club functions with your child whenever possible. Children should always have a parent or guardian attend meetings with them, to provide them with support during meetings & activities.
- Guide your child as they select 4-H projects to explore, and help them develop challenging, but also realistic. Encourage their project work by making it a experience.
- Stay informed in regards to any important club, county, & state level 4-H events & deadlines. You can do so in the following ways:

- The 4-H staff will provide countywide training on project records, presentations, and other core 4-H learning experiences. By understanding more about these 4-H programs, you can help your child excel and take advantage of all that 4-H has to offer.
- Attend the end-of-year 4-H Awards Day with your child (the county-wide awards program held in October or November) as a family. Recognition always means more to children when their families are there to share it with them.
- Complete new enrollment forms, media releases, and medical releases each year

What are the four "H's"? The "H's" stand for: Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. Club members recite the 4-H pledge at meetings.

What is the 4-H Pledge? I pledge, my head to clearer thinking, my heart to great loyalty, my hands to larger service, and my health to better living for my club, my community, my country, and my world.

What is the 4-H motto? "To Make the Best Better"

How did 4-H begin? 4-H began in the early 1900's as Corn Clubs for boys and Tomato Canning Clubs for girls. Although the program has changed a lot through the years, it has always been a program designed to help children become productive members of their communities.

Do I have to live on a farm to join 4-H? No, although 4-H began as a program for rural children, today 4-H is available for all children whether they live on a farm or in the city.

Do boys and girls attend different clubs? No, all 4-H clubs are open to both boys and girls.

How old do you have to be to join a 4-H club? Children can join a 4-H club as soon as they turn 5 years old by Sept. 1, and they can stay involved until they are 19 years 4-H age (some exceptions apply for contests).

4-H Cloverbuds - 4-H ages 5-7

4-H Regular Members - 4-H ages 8-18

What does 4-H age mean? 4-H members ages are determined by the 4-H year that runs September 1 to August 31 each year. Whichever age you are as of September 1, will remain your 4-H age throughout that current 4-H year.

What does it cost to join a 4-H club? There is no membership fee to join a 4-H on the county level. Your club leader will discuss any club level membership fees that may exist. Costs for projects vary depending on the project.

Do I have to re-enroll in 4-H each year to participate? Yes, you are required to re-enroll each of your youth and/or adult members once the new 4-H year arises (September 1 each year). You can enroll each year starting on the dates that is determined by the State 4-H program.

Do I have to wear a specific uniform? No, but some events and competitions do require certain dress codes.

Do parents and guardians attend meetings with their children? Yes! 4-H is a family program. Parents/guardians are encouraged to attend club meetings and 4-H events with their child. It is a great way for families to learn and grow together. A parent, guardian or adult helper should be present at each club meeting for youth who are 5-8 years old.

Project work is an important part of 4-H. A 4-H project is simply a topic that the member chooses to explore during the year. Youth may choose to participate in as many projects as they wish. Some youth may take an entire year to work on a project record. Others may complete a project record within a few months.

When enrolling on 4-H Online each year, youth are asked to choose which project categories they would like to participate within. Did you forget to add one? No problem! Just log back into your account and add it. There is no penalty for expressing interests in a project category and then not participating within it on 4-H Online.

Project work is self-paced and individual. The project the child chooses should reflect his or her interests. Keep in mind that the topic a child chooses isn't the most important part of project work. It is the process of completing a project that helps youth develop skills in:

- Setting and completing goals
- Keeping records
- Creative writing
- Organization

- Leadership
- Citizenship
- Development of skills and
- knowledge in project area
- Problem-Solving
- Critical Thinking
- Communication
- Community service

The process begins when children select projects based upon their interests and age level. Children should receive guidance from their parents or guardians when they select projects.

Although new families are welcome to select additional projects, we recommend that they work on the group projects as well! These group projects will be a rewarding experience for each member and help them gain additional life skills.

Mountrail County 4-H County Level Events

Mountrail County 4-H offers a wide variety of activities and events. Here are brief explanations on some of our annual activities & events...

Achievement Days

Some counties have a fair...we have Achievement Days! Achievement Days is the largest event of the 4-H year & most importantly...FUN! This event is where 4-H members bring and showcase their projects and all they have learned and accomplished during the current 4-H year. This is a time and place for youth and adults to work together to provide a positive and educational experience for all involved. Projects are interview judged to provide positive feedback to youth.

Mountrail County 4-H exhibit categories follow the ND State Fair Exhibitor Handbook each year. Make sure that your project will fit under one of their categories to ensure that you can present it at Achievement Days each year. Small Animal & Livestock Day Camps

Pet Show

For this event, youth are encouraged to bring their pets/animals and showcase them in a laid-back non-competitive atmosphere. We have held this event at local daycares and also invited assisted living individuals to join in on the fun! You may bring any manageable animal to these Pet Shows (cats, dogs, hamsters, rabbits, goats, sheep, cows, horses, etc.)

The Mountrail County 4-H Council may offer up to a 50% reimbursement for ONE 4-H camp per registered member each year. The % is determined by funds raised during our annual fundraisers.

Judging Teams

<u>Crop Judging</u> ~ Crop judging participants evaluate crops for seed and factors effecting market quality, and identify crop and weed seeds and plants.

<u>Hippology/Horse Judging</u> ~ Hippology provides an opportunity for youth enrolled in 4-H equine projects to demonstrate their knowledge of equine science-related subject matter in a competitive setting where attitudes of friendliness & fairness prevail. Hippology is an activity that can make learning fun for 4-H members by letting them exhibit their knowledge and understanding of equine science and husbandry...without even having to own a horse! Quiz Bowl allows youth to demonstrate their knowledge of equine science.

<u>Livestock Judging</u> ~ Livestock judging consist of carefully analyzing a group of animals and measuring them against a standard that is commonly accepted as being ideal. Livestock Quiz Bowl allows youth to demonstrate their knowledge on all food animal species.

<u>Meat Judging</u> - Meat Judging provides an opportunity for youth enrolled in 4-H Livestock projects to enhance their carcass evaluation and retail identification skills. Meat judging programs are currently the most effective tool for the recruitment and development of future meat science technologist in existence today.



Youth archery & air rifle shooting is offered to youth each winter! Youth can join us at the offered shoots and receive hands of experience and also learn important safety knowledge. You can utilize these county trainings to help build your skills and advance to district & state level shooting sport events.

Workshops/Project Day

Mountrail County 4-H offers a wide variety of project days throughout the year! Just a few that have been offered are painting, cooking, scrapbooking, leathercraft, science and engineering, woodworking, wood arts, needle arts, and so much more! Awards Day

Mountrail County holds an annual Awards Day in the late fall. This is the day where all 4-H youth, adults, and families get together to celebrate youth and adult 4-H member accomplishments throughout the 4-H year! Youth are awarded prizes that they have earned throughout the year and adult volunteers receive recognition for their support of the 4-H program. Typically, a pot luck style meal takes place and fun games for all!















Fundraisers

Each year Mountrail County 4-H teams up with our clubs and the community to raise funds for our 4-H Program. These fundraisers are also a wonderful way to showcase our 4-H youth to the community!





Living Exhibits

<u>Communication Arts</u> - The world of communication impacts you every day. By participating in the 4-H communication project, you will explore the exciting world of communication, and learn more about yourself and others.

- ** Learn written, oral and visual communication skills.
- ** Develop self-confidence through public presentations.
- ** Practice self-expression and creativity.
- ** Learn how to organize and present information.

<u>Project Expo</u> - Project Expo provides youth with an experience in planning, preparing and displaying an article or an educational exhibit. It is an opportunity for self-expression both verbally and visually. Project Expo also provides the opportunity to share with others what has been learned in the specific project completed third through twelfth grades can compete in the Rube Goldberg Challenge. Youth will use their STEM knowledge and skills to solve problems, plan, and design a solution.





Clothing Revue - Clothing Revue includes entries for Buy & Show, Sew & Show, and Decorate Your Duds categories. Buy & Show participants purchase or recycle a major item of clothing which relates to a wardrobe plan. Sew & Show participants construct half or more of clothing that is modeled. Decorate Your Duds participants create embellishments for a garment or accessory.

The purpose of the State 4-H Clothing Revue is to help youth:

- 1. Build self-confidence and poise;
- 2. Make and model a garment that is needed in the wardrobe
- 3. Share knowledge and skill learned through 4-H Constructed Clothing Revue participation with others.

<u>Consumer Decision Making</u> - Every day you make decisions, such as what you are going to eat, what you are going to wear, or what to buy. Consumer Decision Making teaches you how to make decisions based on information that you have learned and studied and on facts that you have collected. It can also help you learn to defend your decisions.

The 4-H Consumer Decision Making Contest can help you practice making decisions by matching your knowledge, skills and abilities against those of others. You will learn to rank items based on standards and quality.
